### **H.E. Anderson, Printer For Engraving Bureau**

Henry E. Anderson, 99, who worked for the Bureau of Engraving in the days when money was printed on hand presses, died Wednesday at Potomac Valley Nursing Home in Rockville.

Born in Chicago, he came to Washington in 1893 and worked for the Bureau of Engraving for the next 41 years, retiring in 1934.

When he was 90 years old, he visited the Bureau and saw the hand press he had used as a plate printer (it is now on display as an antique). He was awarded a 40-year service pin by Bureau officials.

In retirement, he lived at 1809 Irving st. nw. His wife died 24 years ago and his stepson 10 years ago.

Though in bad health in recent years, he continued to live on Irving Street until three weeks ago when he entered the nursing home.

### **H.E. Anderson, 99, Engraving Bureau Printer 40 Years**

Henry E. Anderson, 99, a printer at the Bureau of Engraving for 40 years, died at the Potomac Valley Nursing Home Wednesday after a short illness. Before moving recently to the nursing home, he had lived at 1809 Irving St. NW.

Mr. Anderson was born in Chicago and attended schools there. He came to Washington in the 1890s and began working for the Bureau of Engraving just after the turn of the century. He retired in 1943. His wife, Maryjane, died in 1949.

Mr. Anderson, who left no immediate survivors, was a member of the Benjamin B. French Lodge, No. 15, of the Masonic order. He also was a member of St. Stephen's of the Incarnation Episcopal Church.
