Victor Beyer, 74, Dies After a Long Illness

Victor Beyer, seventy-four years old, one of the District's oldest inhabitants and a familiar figure in the Center Market since the civil war, died at 1 o'clock this morning at his home, 507 Alabama avenue, Congress Heights. Mr. Beyer had been in good health until about six months ago. Four months ago he became confined to his bed. Death was caused by nervous prostration.

Funeral services, to be attended by members of the Association of the Oldest Inhabitants, are to be held at the family home, Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. George W. Davenport, pastor of the Emmanuel Church of Anacostia, is to officiate. Pending final disposition of the body, it will be placed in a vault.

Mr. Beyer was born in Anacostia January 1, 1841. All his life, since early manhood, he had engaged in the marketing business. His gardens are located at Shepherd's. His wholesale store in Center Market has been one of the centers of trade there since anti-bellum days.

Mr. Beyers always took an active interest in the affairs of the National Capital. He was a member of the Association of the Oldest Inhabitants, of Salem Lodge of Odd Fellows and of Mineola Tribe of Red Men.

His wife, Amanda Beyer, and three daughters, Miss Nora Beyer, Miss Edna Beyer and Miss Lulu Beyer, survive him.
