Ms. Bielaski was born in old Georgetown in 1863. Her grandfather, Thomas Woodward was coroner of the District of Columbia at the time of the assassination of President Lincoln and her greatgrandfather, Stephen George Roszel, was one of the most famous clergymen in this area.

Descendant of Colonist

She was a direct descendant of John Israel, one of the pioneer colonists of Maryland.

Rev. Bielaski, who died about 11 years ago, served in several churches in the Washington area, including the Union and Ryland M.E. Churches and the Methodist Episcopal Churches at North Capitol and K streets, Kensington and Brookland.
