A Conductor Run Over

It Was at First Thought He Was Fatally Injured

About 5:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon Mr. Hamilton Bronaugh, conductor of car No. 19, Washington and Georgetown railroad, was seriously if not fatally injured on 1st street between the Peace and Garfield monuments by being run over by his car. He had quite a load on the car and running to the front to get his fares attempted to get on, but missed his footing and fell. Before the car could be stopped Mr. Bronaugh had been struck by the heels of a horse on the head and the front wheel had passed over one of his legs.

The sixth precinct patrol wagon was summoned and he was taken to Providence Hospital, and it was at first thought that the injuries and shock would result in his death. This morning the physicians found his condition improved and it is believed that he will survive, but it will be necessary to amputate his leg. Mr. Bronaugh is a native of the District, residing at 3328 O street, West Washington, aged about thirty-five years and had long been in the employ of the railroad.
