Miss Croggon Dies; Funeral Tomorrow

Member of Society of Natives Was 72 Years Old

Miss Josephine Hall Croggon, 72, whose father, the late James Croggon, as a reporter for The Star wrote the news account of President Lincoln's assassination, died Wednesday at her home, 625 Maryland avenue northeast, after a long illness.

A former clerk at the Pension Office, Miss Croggon retired about 12 years ago, after 40 years of Government service.

A member of one of the city's oldest families, she belonged to the Society of Natives of the District of Columbia and the Waugh M.E. Church, and was a charter member of Treaty Oak Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star. Her father was one of the five organizers of the Sons of Jonadab. Her mother was the late Mrs. Elizabeth C. Croggon.

Miss Croggon is survived by two sisters, Miss Louisa Croggon and Miss Mary F. Croggon.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow at 2 p.m. at her late residence. Rev. Allan F. Poore and Rev. Howard F. Downs will officiate. Burial will be in Congressional Cemetery.
