Frederick G. Dieterick, Patent Attorney, Dies

Active in Law for Forty Years

Came Here When 15--Belonged to Many Lodges

Frederick G. Dieterick, for forty years a well-known patent attorney, died suddenly Tuesday at his home, 3427 13th street. He had been suffering from intestinal troubles. He was sixty-five years old. Funeral services will be at Lee's undertaking establishment, 332 Pennsylvania avenue northwest, this afternoon at 3 o'clock. Rev. B.F. Rhodes of the Ingram Memorial Church will officiate. The interment will be in Congressional cemetery.

Mr. Dieterick came to Washington when a lad of fifteen years and has resided here since. He was educated in the schools of Washington and after finishing his studies he established himself in the practice of patent law. He was a member of the Mystic Shrine, BPO Elks, Knights Templar and was past master of Hope Lodge of Masons. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Dieterick and four children, Albert E. and Louis Dieterick of this city. Mrs. Harris Wright of Livingston, N.J., and Mrs. Fred Kniet of Mount Clair, N.J., and a sister, Mrs. George Lerch of this city.
