Charles Freer, 49 Years With Engraving Bureau

Charles Clifton Freer, 77, who was employed by the Bureau of Engraving and Printing for 49 years, died Wednesday of a heart condition at his home, 9402 Riley place, Silver Spring.

Mr. Freer was custodian of the vault at the bureau at the time of his retirement in 1949, when he received the Albert Gallatin Award from the Treasury Department for distinguished service.

A lifelong resident of this area, he was born in Anacostia. He worked briefly for the Panama Canal Commission before going with Treasury.

Mr. Freer was a trustee of Eckington Presbyterian Church, and a member of East Gate Masonic Lodge No. 34.

He is survived by his widow Mary Ann of the home address; a son, Charles A. Freer, 10934 Montrose avenue, Garrett Park, Md.; two daughters, Mrs. Mary C. Robertson, Rogers Heights, Md., and Mr. Helen A. Olin, 440 Orange street S.E.; six grandchildren, and a brother, George Freer of Los Altos, Calif.

Charles C. Freer, 77, a Treasury Department employe for almost 50 years and winner of the Department's highest award for outstanding service, died Wednesday of a heart attack at his home, 9402 Riley pl., Silver Spring.

Mr. Freer went to work for the Panama Canal Commission in 1898 and in 1900 joined the Treasury Department's Bureau of Engraving. He received the Albert Gallatin Award upon his retirement in 1949.
