Another Assault On The Policemen

Last Saturday, patrolman Garrett, of Seventh Ward police, was attacked by a number of marines while in the vicinity of Tin Pot alley. Notwithstanding the number against him, he succeeded in fighting his way through, and, with several patrolmen and good citizens who came to his assistance, secured the arrest of the three principals, Isaac Harris, John Cuff, and --- Donaldson, and they were sent to jail for court by Justice Stratton.

Garrett was but slightly hurt, but Harris, the leader of the party, had his head severely cut, and a finger knocked off in the fight with Garrett, who used his staff like an old hand. Garrett is the partner of Larcombe, the patrolman who was so seriously injured by soldiers in the same locality last week.

Funeral

The funeral of the late Henry A. Garrett, a member of the Metropolitan Police force, and a well-known resident of South Washington, took place from his late residence corner of 7th and E streets, and it was well attended.

The services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Baldwin, of Ryland Chapel, and at their conclusion, the remains were taken to the Congressional Cemetery, where they were interred.

The procession was composed of a detail of fifty policemen under Lieut. Noonan; Lincoln Camp No. 2, Sons of Liberty, headed by Heald's Washington Band; Eastern Lodge No. 7, and Columbian Encampment No. 1, I.O.O.F., headed by Prosperi's Band.
