### **Rites for George C. Glick Set for This Afternoon**

Funeral services for George C. Glick, 67, former Capitol guide who died Saturday at his home, 313 Seventeenth street S.E., will be held this afternoon at the Murray funeral home. Burial will be in Congressional Cemetery.

A native of Washington, Mr. Glick was a Capitol guide for more than 30 years and in later years liked to recall the many parties he had shown through the building. He used to tell of the time he escorted Queen Liliuokalani, the last queen of the Hawaiian Islands, on a tour of the Capitol when she came to this country in the early 1900s. He said she was much impressed with the building where the laws of her country were then being made.

During the recent war, Mr. Glick, who had retired as a guide was employed as a guard by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. He resigned last April.

Mr. Glick was an active member of the Southeast Citizens Association and once was secretary of the organization. He also was a member of the Elks.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Anna E. Glick, three daughters, Mrs. Grace Merryman, Miss Ethel Glick and Miss Lorena Glick, all of Washington, and a son, T/Sergt. Bertram S. Glick, a member of the Air Forces band at Bolling Field.
