Charles T. Goodall, Parks Worker, Dies **Veteran Gardener Was Authority on Ferns and Orchids.** **Funeral Today**

Charles T. Goodall, veteran gardener of the National Capital Parks, who died Thursday at Emergency Hospital, will be buried this afternoon at Congressional Cemetery. Funeral services are to be at 2 p.m. at Chambers' funeral home.

Born here in 1876, Mr. Goodall entered the employ of the Government in 1891 as a water boy, advancing through various ranks to the position of horticultural foreman. He was regarded by his associates as an expert on ferns and orchids.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Ruth Goodall, who lives at the residence, 1429 Columbia road, and one daughter, Mrs. Vanessa Henkel of Alexandria, Va.

Charles T. Goodall Funeral Set Today

Charles L. Goodall, of 1429 Columbia road, who served the Capital's park system 43 years, will be buried today in Congressional Cemetery. He died Thursday, ten days after sickness compelled him to leave his duties as foreman gardener of the Office of National Capital Parks.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. at the W.W. Chambers chapel, Fourteenth and Chapin streets northwest. Immediate survivors are his wife, Ruth, and a daughter, Mrs. Vanessa Henkel.

Born July 12, 1876, Goodall entered the service of the old Office of Public Buildings and Public Grounds as a water boy in 1892.
