John J. Grolig, 59, Contractor, Dies

John J. Grolig, 59, well known brick contractor, who helped build a number of large buildings in this area, died unexpectedly of a heart attack Sunday in his home, 5327 Forty-third street, N.W.

Since coming here in 1917 as bricklayer superintendent for construction of the Hotel Washington, Mr. Grolig had played a leading role in the building of large private homes, churches and schools in Washington, Virginia and Maryland.

His work included the British Embassy, Montgomery Blair and Bethesda Chevy Chase High Schools and Dumbarton Oaks. He had his own contracting firm, with offices at his residence.

Mr. Grolig was president of the Bricklayer Contractors'
Association. A charter member of the Petworth Masonic Lodge No.
47, he also belonged to the Brightwood Commandery and was past

Patron of the Chevy Chase chapter, Order of the Eastern Star. He was a parishioner of All Saints Episcopal Church, Chevy Chase Circle.
