William S. Hall, 57, treasurer of the Peoples Life Insurance Co., died yesterday at his home, 4200 Thirty-eighth street N.W., after an illness of about a month.

A native of this city, Mr. Hall attended elementary schools here and was graduated from Business High School. His first employment was with the Pullman Co., as auditor. Subsequently he was connected with the Insurance Department of the District of Columbia. He became connected with the Peoples Life Insurance Co. 21 years ago.

His service with the company was interrupted during the World War, when he served as deputy commissioner of the War Risk Insurance Bureau. There he helped formulate a number of codes dealing with insurance. The Peoples Life Insurance Co. operates in the District, Maryland, Virginia, Delaware and West Virginia.

A charter member of the Chain and Sprocket Club, Mr. Hall formerly was a member of the National Press Club and the Washington Canoe Club.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Mary Talley Hall; a sister, Mrs. M.W. Perley, and a brother, Emory Hall, all of this city.
