### **William B. Hartley Is Claimed By Death**

#### **Member of Association of Oldest Inhabitants Had Lived Here Since Civil War**

William B. Hartley, 82 years old, retired merchandise broker, Civil War veteran and prominent in fraternal and church circles, died at his residence, 513 A street southeast, Thursday, after an illness of about three weeks. He was a member of the Association of Oldest Inhabitants of the District of Columbia.

Mr. Hartley was a past grand chaplain of the Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows of the District of Columbia and was for many years chaplain of Union Lodge, No. 11, I.O.O.F., of which he was a member for 61 years. He was a member also of the Fred D. Stuart Encampment, No. 7, I.O.O.F.

For more than 60 years a member of the First Methodist Protestant Church of this city, Mr. Hartley formerly was president of the board of stewards there and served as superintendent of the Sunday school for 20 years.

A resident of Washington continuously since the Civil War, Mr. Hartley continued in business as merchandise broker until retiring about four years ago. He served in the United States Marine Corps during the conflict between the North and South. He was a member of Burnside Post, G.A.R.

Funeral services will be conducted at the residence Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Rev. W.A. Melvin of Baltimore and Rev. T.J. Turkington, pastor of the First M.P. Church here, will officiate, with the Grand Army of the Republic, the Odd Fellows and the Association of Oldest Inhabitants taking part in the services.

Mr. Hartley is survived by a son, William P. Hartley; two daughters, Miss Eunice F. Hartley and Miss S. Dorothea Hartley, and a brother, Joseph H. Hartley, all of this city. His wife was the late Mrs. Sarah Pritchard Hartley.

**Organizations of Which He Had Been a Member Represented at Services**

Funeral services for William B. Hartley, retired merchandise broker, who died at his home, 513 A street southeast, Thursday, were conducted at the residence this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Rev. W.A. Melvin of Baltimore, and Rev. T.J. Turkington, pastor of the First M.P. Church of this city, of which Mr. Hartley had been a member for more than 60 years officiated. Interment was in Congressional Cemetery.

The Association of Oldest Inhabitants of the District of Columbia, the Grand Army of the Republic and the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, of all of which Mr. Hartley was a member, were represented at the funeral.

Mr. Hartley, who was 82 years old, was past grand chaplain of the Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows of the District of Columbia, and was for many years chaplain of Union Lodge, No. 11, I.O.O.F., of which he had been a member for 60 years. He also was a former president of the board of stewards of the First M.P. Church and was superintendent of the Sunday school for 20 years. He had been a resident of Washington continuously since honorably discharged from the Marine Corps, in which he served during the Civil War. He retired from business about four years ago.
