Veteran in Government Service and Member of the Association of Oldest Inhabitants

William J. Hendricks, veteran employe of the Government Printing Office, died at his home, 141 Spruce street, Lyon Village, Va., last night, after a long illness. He was 62 years old. Mr. Hendricks had never completely recovered from injuries sustained in an automobile accident last December.

Mr. Hendricks, who had been employed in the Government Printing Office for 42 years, at the time of his death was deputy disbursing officer.

Born at Hunting Point, Long Island, N.Y., Mr. Hendricks came to this city in his early youth and entered the Government service. He was widely known here in civic and fraternal circles.

He was a member of Hope Lodge of Masons and was former president of the Federal Employes Local Union, No. 2. He was a member of the Association of Oldest Inhabitants of the District of Columbia.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Margaret Morgan Hendricks; a son, Gorman M. Hendricks, and two sisters, Mrs. Laura Chandle and Mrs. Katherine Morgan of Chevy Chase, Md.

Funeral services will be conducted at the residence tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock. Interment will be in Congressional Cemetery.
