Member of Old District Family. Was Known for Her Numerous Charities

Mrs. Marie Antoinette Holtzman, who died at her residence, 3240 School street northwest, at 8:20 o'clock last night, will be buried from St. Patrick's Church Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. Rev. Father McGuigan of the assistant clergy of the parish will conduct the requiem mass. The interment will be in the family plot at Congressional cemetery.

Mrs. Holtzman, who was the widow of R.O. Holtzman, for many years one of the most prominent real estate men of the National Capital, was a member of the Simms family, which is one of the oldest in Washington.

Beloved by Wide Circle

She always took a great interest in charitable work and some years ago built a chapel for St. Vincent's Orphan Asylum. On account of her numerous charitable bequests she was known and beloved in a wide circle of people whose existence she did all in her power to make easier and brighter.

Mrs. Holtzman had been ill for about two months past and during the past few days she gradually became weaker until the end came last night. Gathered about the bedside when she breathed her last were her sister, Mrs. S.A. Miller; her niece, Mrs. A.G. Bentley, and a sister-in-law, Mrs. Byron S. Adams.

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Mrs. Holtzman's Will

Requests Made to Local Charitable Institutions-Other Wills Filed

By the terms of the will of Mrs. Marie A. Holtzman, widow of R.O. Holtzman, dated April 11, 1901, bequests of \$500 each are made to St. Vincent's Orphan Asylum, St. Joseph's Orphan Asylum, Little Sisters of the Poor, St. Arin's Infant Asylum, St. Rose's Industrial School and the Central Dispensary and Emergency Hospital.

A diamond ring and two carriages are left to her sister Mrs. Estelle Adams; \$500 to Miss Josephine Hicks, and \$2,000 to her sister Mrs. Frances B. McIntyre. The remain estate is devised to another sister, Mrs. Sabina M. Miller, who is named as executrix.
