Victim of Consumption

Death of William F. Hunter in Denver, Col.

Mr. Wm. F. Hunter of this city, formerly a telegrapher in the Washington office of the Associated press, died in Denver, Col., at 10:30 o'clock Friday night of consumption. Mr. Hunter had been suffering with the disease for over four years. He left Washington for the west soon after its symptoms developed, in the hope that the change of climate would restore his health. He spent most of his time in Denver and its environments, and for a time the change proved beneficial, but during the past year he gradually declined.

Mr. Hunter was one of the most popular young men in Washington. His bright, genial disposition won for him a host of friends. He was well-known among those of his craft as a remarkably fine telegrapher for one of his years and experience. He was twenty-three years old. His remains will be brought to Washington for interment. The funeral will occur from the residence of his parents, 607 3d street northeast, probably Wednesday next.
