On Saturday morning, when he got up, he felt well as usual, and after eating a hearty breakfast went to attend to his business at the office of the Franklin Insurance Company, of which he was president. He was there taken suddenly ill of inflammation of the bowels, and was taken home, and died as above stated. Mr. Ingle has, during his long life, held many prominent and responsible positions, as president of the Patriotic Bank, cashier of the Bank of Washington, etc., etc. Mr. Ingle has held various municipal offices with much credit.
