John Javins, 907 Seventh street northeast, Washington, a flagman on the Pennsylvania Railroad, fell from the rear car of his train at about 9:30 o'clock last night between the Lafayette avenue station and Edmondson avenue and was fatally hurt when the train backed upon him. It is believed that his footing slipped on the ice-covered steps.

When other men of the train crewe reached him it was found that his right side was crushed in and that he was bleeding badly. He was placed on the train, taken to Union Station as quickly as possible and then to Mercy Hospital. He died before reaching the hospital. Dr. Levy, of the hospital, made a post-mortem examination.
