Henry W. Kuhn Dies of Injuries by Automobile Knocked Down by Machine While Crossing Street Near Home Resident Here Since 1863

Henry W. Kuhn, seventy-six years old, who had been a resident of Southeast Washington since 1863, shortly after he came to this country from Doetzbach, Germany, was knocked down yesterday afternoon by an automobile while crossing the street near his home, 701 11th street southeast, and hurt so periously that he died at Casualty Hospital three hours later. The accident and death occurred just three months after he celebrated the fiftieth

anniversary of his marriage.

John Lenwood Bailey, seventeen years old, 115 E street southeast, who was driving the car that knocked him down, is being detained at the fifth precinct police station to await the outcome of an inquest that is scheduled for late this afternoon. It is the statement of the police that the boy was backing the automobile when the accident occurred.

Member of Masonic Bodies

Mr. Kuhn was married four years after he reached this city. His wife, who is a native of Neiderstat, Germany, came here and renewed her acquaintance with him and soon they were married. They have seven children and six grandchildren. Their children are Mrs. Catherine Graff, Mrs. Sophia Prediger, Mrs. Lizzie America and Charles, Leonard, John and William Kuhn.

The deceased was a member of DeMolay Commandery No. 4, and Anacostia Lodge #21, F.A.A.M. and had served three terms as master of the latter body. He also was a member of the Butchers Benevolent Association and carried a gold headed cane that was presented to him by that organization in 1876. Funeral services are to be conducted Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock at his late residence. Interment is to be in Congressional Cemetery.
