Accident To A Police Officer

About 2 o'clock this morning Officer C.T. Leach, of the sixth police precinct, while running to what he supposed to be a fire, but which turned out to be the aurora borealis, fell over a pole in the street, near the corner of 8th and I streets, and injured his left knee seriously. He was taken to his residence shortly afterwards and received the attention of a physician.
