Dr. H.T.A. Lemon Dies; Well Known Physician

Studied Medicine While He Was School Principal and Success Was Signal

Dr. Hanson T.A. Lemon, one of the best known physicians in the District of Columbia, died yesterday afternoon at his residence, 1847 Kalorama road, after a brief illness. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Maud Duvall Lemon, daughter of the late Andrew B. Duvall, and three children, James H. Lemon, Mary Louise Lemon and Andrew Duvall Lemon. Two brothers, Harry M. Lemon and Williams F. Lemon, both of Washington, are also living.

Dr. Lemon was the son of the Rev. James H.M. Lemon. He was born in Baltimore in 1869. He was educated in the Baltimore public schools and the Baltimore City College, after which he came to this city, where he was appointed principal of the Jefferson School. In addition to his duties he took up the study of medicine at Columbian University, now George Washington University, and soon after receiving his degree as a physician began the practice of that profession, at which he obtained signal success.

In addition to a large private practice Dr. Lemon for a number of years was local surgeon for the Pennsylvania railroad and the Southern railway. He was on the executive committee of the Medical Society of the District of Columbia and a member of the Metropolitan Club. At the time of his death he was one of the trustees of the Metropolitan Memorial M.E. Church.

Funeral services will be held at the home on Kalorama road Thursday morning at 11 o'clock and interment will be in Congressional Cemetery.
