## **Funeral of H.T. Markward**

The funeral services over the remains of the late Howard Taylor Markward will take place tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock at his late residence, 717 22d street northwest. The services will be conducted by the Rev. William Tayloe Snyder, rector of the Church of the Incarnation, who was a personal friend of the deceased. Mr. Markward was born in this city 58 years ago, and at the outbreak of the civil war enlisted in one of the District regiments. He was prominently identified with the local branch of the Master Painters' Association and was the treasurer of that body for a period of ten years. He was a member of the Mount Vernon Chapter of the Knights of Pythias and of Potomac Post, No. 11, Grand Army of the Republic. The deceased is survived by his wife, son, mother and two sisters--Mrs. Katherine Markward, Mr. George T. Markward, Mrs. E. Markward and Mrs. E.C. Reld and Mrs. J.W. Thompson. The interment will be in Congressional cemetery.

## **Funeral of Howard T. Markward**

A pretty feature of the ceremony was the placing on the casket of the rose and laurel leaf. The funeral took place at 10 o'clock this morning from the late home of Howard Taylor Markwood, 717 22d street northwest, and Rev. Dr. Snyder officiated. Deceased was born in Washington fifty-eight years ago, and served in one of the District of Columbia commands in the civil war.
