Sidney Roche Resigns

Leaves Office of District Auditor to Enter Private Business

The Commissioners have received the resignation of Sidney Roche, a \$1,600 clerk in the office of the auditor, Mr. Roche's retirement from office to take effect on February 1. A successor to the position has not yet been chosen, but it is intimated that there will be promotions all along the line in the auditor's office, with an appointment at the bottom of the ladder. Mr. Roche will assume the management of a prominent down-town business house.

Auditor Garrison, in submitting the resignation, paid a compliment to Mr. Roche when he said: "It is with sincere regret that I transmit this resignation. The record of Mr. Roche in the auditor's office deserves the highest commendation. His ability as a bookkeeper and accountant is exceptional. He has served the District of Columbia with marked ability and devotion to duty."

Mr. Roche was appointed a clerk in the auditor's office on August 11, 1902, since which date he received two promotions. Previously he had twelve years' experience in business life as an expert accountant.
