Miss Shaffer Dies; Florist Was 57

Miss Mabel Shaffer, 57, florist, died in Providence Hospital yesterday following an operation.

For the last six years, Miss Shaffer had conducted a florist business at 615 Pennsylvania avenue southeast, in partnership with her brother, Arthur J. Shaffer. Previously, for 15 years, she had been chief buyer for Mayer Bros., florists.

Miss Shaffer was a native of Prince Georges County, Md., but had lived in Washington most of her life. She was a member of the Order of the Eastern Star, and of the Sons and Daughters of Liberty. She was the daughter of the late John P. Shaffer and the late Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Shaffer.

Besides the brother with whom she was in business, Miss Shaffer leaves another brother, George C. Shaffer, florist, at Fourteenth and I streets, and two sisters, Miss Iola Shaffer and Mrs. Maude R. Crown, all of this city.

Funeral services will be held at 1 p.m. tomorrow at her late residence, No. 9 Girard street northeast. Burial will be in Congressional Cemetery.
