Sniffin, 69 years old, senior clerk in charge of the New York-Washington division of the Railway Mail Service, who died Friday at the Mineola Hospital, Long Island, New York, will be held tomorrow afternoon from the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Ruth S. Preparing to retire from service, Mr. Sniffin went to New York on March 21 to submit his final equipment report. The following day he was taken ill. While in the hospital his retirement became effective. He was commended for his long and faithful service by Postmaster General Brown.

In point of service, Mr. Sniffin, with a 48-year service record was the oldest employe in the New York-Washington division.
