## The Evening Star, August 15, 1925, p. 15 Youth Is Trapped In Sand Bank Fall George L. Taylor in Serious Condition After Quarter Hour Buried Under Cave-In

A sand bank caved in on 17-year-old George L. Taylor of 2224 Sixteenth street southeast while he and Raymond Jones, 14, 1524 W street southeast, a friend, were digging on the old Butler estate at Stanton and Morris roads southeast yesterday. Taylor was completely buried by te cave-in, Jones wiggled out of the deep sand and summoned assistance.

After half a dozen rescue workers had used picks, hands and improvised instruments for more than a quarter of an hour Taylor was dragged out in a serious condition and rushed to the office of Dr. T.D. Mudd, 1328 Good Hope road southeast, where he was given first-aid treatment.

His family doctor, Carlton King of 2013 Nichols avenue, was called in on the case and he found that the boy had sustained a puncture of the lung and fractures of the ribs.

Dr. King ordered the youth to Providence Hospital, where he was in a serious condition last night.

According to the police at the Eleventh precinct, the two boys had gone to the old Butler estate and were playing with the picks, digging in the sand.

The overhang of the bank was not noticed by Taylor until it suddenly gave way and buried him.

## The Evening Star, August 15, 1925, p. 2 Sand Bank Collapse Is Fatal To Youth George L. Taylor's Rib Is Broken in Cave-In and Lung Is Punctured, Causing Death

Seventeen-year-old George L. Taylor, 2224 Sixteenth street southeast, who was covered with sand Saturday afternoon as a result of a cave-in while he and a companion were digging in a sand bank near Stanton and Morris roads southeast, died at Providence Hospital early yesterday morning.

Taylor suffered a fracture of a rib, which pierced his lung, Drs. T.D. Mudd and Carlton King rendered first aid before the injured boy was taken to the hospital. His condition was so serious, however, that physicians were unable to hold out hope for his recovery. Coroner Nevitt deemed an inquest unnecessary.
