## **Car Avoids Collision; Autoist Fatally Hurt**

## George C. Taylor Dies at Hospital After Machine Overturns Near Clark Station

George C. Taylor of 1361-1/2 L street southeast died at Emergency Hospital today from injuries received when an automobile in which he was riding overturned on Military road, near Clark Station, Va., at 7 o'clock this morning.

Three other occupants of the car are at the hospital with minor injuries. They are: Lawrence Burr, 1119 13th street northeast; Richard Frye, 476 I street southwest, and Joseph Heflin, 1132 6th street southwest.

#### On Their Way to Work

All of the men were mechanic employes at Camp Humphreys, Va., and were on their way to work when the accident occurred. According to reports received here, the machine was guided to the edge of the road to make room for an approaching vehicle and went into a depression.

Mr. Taylor was a plumber and had been employed at Camp Humphreys for some time. He left home early this morning. He usually traveled to the camp in an automobile.

The first his wife, Mrs. Essie H. Taylor, heard of was when one of the men who had been in the machine called at the L street house and informed her. She was prostrated by the news.

#### Native of This City

Taylor was born in this city twenty-five years ago. Besides his wife, a two-year-old child and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles C. Taylor, survive him.
