Frederick Wendell Tebben, 75, who retired in 1996 as vice president of the National Valuation Co., an investment evaluation agency in Washington, died of lung cancer Nov 19 at Sibley Memorial Hospital. He was a resident of Washington.

Dr. Tebben was a financial analyst for the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. in Washington in the 19770s and 1980s before joining National Valuation.

He was born in Waukegan, Ill. He received a master's degree in finance from George Washington University and a doctorate in finance from the University of Chicago. He also received a diplma in finance and accounting from the London School of Economics.

He was a fellow of the Royal Geographical Society in London. He served for 17 years in the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary and did volunteer work for the U.S. Navy Museum in Washington.

He was a member of Christ Episcopal Church in Washington and the St. Andrew's Society. Survivors include his wife of 33 years, Marian Korb Tebben of Washington.

He was educated in a variety of colleges and universities including the University of Chicago, the George Washington University and the London School of Economics. A financial analyst, he worked in several Federal agencies including the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. He served as a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society, London. A 30-year member of Washington's St. Andrew's Society, he lived in the District of Columbia for 40 years in the Historical Capitol Hill neighborhood and was married to Marian Korb Tebben for 33 years.

He served in the U.S. Navy Reserves and served for 17 years in the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary, Flotilla 73, Bowie, MD, including a stint as Flotilla Commander. He volunteered for 10 years at the U.S. Navy Museum in Washington, D.C. He also volunteered t the Bermuda Maritime Museum, spending a week there twice a year in the conservation laboratory and in other research projects.
