Will Be Made Friday

A coroner's inquest will be held Friday, at 11:30 a.m., in the fatal injury of Frank Thompson, 71 years old, 233 Linworth place southwest, last night when he was struck by a street car near his home. Thompson died at Emergency Hospital five hours after he was injured.

After reviewing the circumstances in the case, Coroner J. Ramsey Nevitt released Motorman Charles W. Lyles and Conductor Herbert Cragg, operators of the Washington-Virginia Railway car that struck Thompson, on their promise to appear at the inquest.

The street car men told Coroner Nevitt that Thompson must have lost his balance in coming down an embankment and ran into the street car. Motorman Lyles did not know of the accident until passengers called it to his attention.
