Turner. The remains of the late Z.A. Turner will be taken from the vault at Congressional Cemetery and interred Thursday, March 14, 1895 at 3 p.m.

A Blacksmith on the Rampage

Zach Turner, a navy-yard blacksmith, started out on a big drunk yesterday morning. Taking offense at being saluted as "Mr." Turner by a neighbor, he went home and arming himself with a terrible looking and really dangerous knife of his own making, with blade a foot long, he went after his new found enemy. Not seeing him he ran fairly amuck through Twelfth, Thirteenth, E and F streets southeast, fighting every one he came across. For nearly half an hour he had all to himself, but on the appearance of a couple of officers he hid his knife and changed his front entirely. But the neighborhood was aroused and demanded the fellow's arrest. On being taken to the station by Officer Geo. Luskey the knife was seen protruding, and the charge of carrying concealed weapons preferred.
