Henry Upperman's Death

Expires Suddenly While Occupying Bench in Judiciary Square

Shortly before 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon a man was seen to fall from one of the benches in Judiciary Square. Park Watchman Jones and several persons who were near the man went to his assistance and Dr. H.L. Mann was summoned. He found that life was extinct and the body was removed to the morgue. The dead man was identified as Henry C. Upperman, a former resident of Baltimore, who roomed at the house of Mrs. Hunt, 225 Indiana avenue. Coroner Nevitt viewed the body and gave a certificate of death from heart disease.

The deceased was sixty-five years old. He had made his home in this city at intervals during recent years. The last time he came here was about ten months ago. It is thought he was making an effort to obtain a government position.

The police found about \$400 in a purse that fell from his pocket in the park, and the superintendent of the morgue made the discovery of about \$1,700 in the pockets of his clothing after the body reached the morgue.

Undertaker Lee took charge of the remains and removed them from the morgue to his establishment where it was prepared for burial. The police notified Mrs. Annie M. Ferris, a niece of the deceased, living in Baltimore, and arrangements were made today for the interment.
