#### **Dr. Clyde Warburton, Retired Agriculture Official, Dies at 70**

Dr. Clyde William Warburton, 70, who retired in 1945 as deputy governor of the Agriculture Department's Farm Credit Administration, died yesterday at his home, 4512 Thirtieth street N.W. He had been ill for eight months.

Dr. Warburton, who spent more than 40 years in Government service, was director of extension work of the Agriculture Department for 17 years. The last five years of his service he was in charge of the Washington office of the Farm Credit Administration.

In 1903 he entered the Bureau of Plant Industry. His appointment to head the extension service was made by the late Secretary Henry C. Wallace, father of Henry A. Wallace. The Agricultural Extension Service works through actual demonstration on the farm and in the farm home. One of its better-known services is the 4-H Clubs of America.

#### *Born on Iowa Farm*

During his years of service, Dr. Warburton taught American farmers how to be better farmers. His field of operations included the entire country.

Born on a farm at Independence, Iowa, he had lived all his life close to farm problems. His principal hobby was gardening.

Dr. Warburton received his B.S. degree from Iowa State College in 1902 and his doctorate of science there in 1925.

He was a member and past officer of the American Society of Agronomy, and editor of the society's journal from 1913 to 1921. In addition, he belonged to the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the Cosmos Club, the Washington Botanical Society and was a fellow in the American Association of Agronomical Science.

#### *Was Fraternity President*

Dr. Warburton's fraternities included Beta Theta Pi, Phi Kappa Phi and Gamma Sigma Delta of which he was national president from 1925 to 1926.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Anne Draper Warburton of the Thirtieth street address; two nieces and a nephew.

Funeral services will be held at 5 p.m. Monday at the All Souls Memorial Episcopal Church of which he was a member for many years. Private burial services will be in Congressional Cemetery.
