### **Truck Victim, 75, Dies At Hospital**

#### **L.G. Warfield's Injury Was Not Regarded as Serious at Time of Accident**

Lorenzo G. Warfield, 75, of 1214 Massachusetts avenue, who was struck by a truck while crossing at Eleventh and Harvard streets October 17, died last night in Garfield Hospital. At the time of the accident it was not supposed that his condition was serious.
