Genevieve L. Zanner, 58, an amateur artist and a long-time resident of the Washington area, died Oct. 8 at Shady Grove Adventist Hospital in Rockville of complications after a stroke.

Mrs. Zanner, a resident of Gaithersburg, was born in Fulda, Minn., and moved to Washington when she was 8. She graduated from the old Business High school in Washington and worked briefly during the 1920s as a clothing designer in Philadelphia.
